



There is no problem in the play as there are 13 easy tricks available in Spades, Hearts or No-Trumps so the only problem is the bidding.

Everyone will be in slam so the only question is how many will be in the Grand Slam? If you play Key Card Blackwood you will learn that your partner has the two red aces and the Queen of Spades. Then when you ask for Kings she will show the King of Hearts. You can count 12 tricks and there must be a 13th somewhere with all that shape.

Even playing ordinary Blackwood you will be able to count the same top 12 tricks and should be confident enough to bid 7S.



An interesting test for your bidding, your play and your defence!

Quite a few E/W pairs will land in 4 • - the contract is a reasonable one but it shouldn't be allowed to make and in fact there are clues from the poorly shaped East hand that E/W should be able to avoid 4 •.

The contact goes down as long as N/S do not do anything silly. Declarer cannot avoid the loss of one Spade trick, one Heart trick and 2 Diamond tricks. And indeed declarer's big problem will be how to avoid losing a fifth trick to the Queen of Clubs for minus two!

However declarer should be able to avoid losing a trick to the Queen of Clubs by using the Ten of Spades in dummy as her entry to dummy to take the Club finesse.



West should be thinking of Slam as soon as he hears his partner open the bidding. East should raise his partner's jump shift response with Qxx support.

East checks on Aces and when he discovers one missing he signs off in 6S. West doesn't need to check about the Queen of Spades – when we have 10 trumps we assume the trump Queen won't be an issue.

The trick here is to find your 4-4 Spade fit and play in 4♠ rather than in 3NT.

If you just bid 2♣-2♦-2NT-3NT then you will miss your Spade fit and get a bad score because you will only make 9 tricks in 3NT compared to the easy 11 tricks in a 4♠ contract.


It makes sense to use Stayman and Transfers here just as you would if partner had opened 2NT and now you can find your Spade fit easily enough....but make sure you tell your partner about your good idea!











East has a difficult responding problem – in the old days 2NT would be the bid – but nowadays the 2NT response is used to show 12+ HCP and 4+ Spade support.

So East has to invent a 2♣ or a 2♦ response (2♥ is a definite no-no as it guarantees a 5-card Heart suit).

On the likely Diamond lead, declarer is facing the prospect of losing 2 Diamonds and 2 Hearts. However there is a cute way to make 10 tricks by using a technique known as the 'Ruffing Finesse'. We need South to hold the &K.

Declarer wins the Diamond lead, cashes the AA, plays the AA and a Spade to dummy's Jack. Now declarer takes the Ruffing Club Finesse by leading the Q from dummy and letting it run (discarding a Diamond loser) if South does not cover. If South does cover, then declarer ruffs and gets back to dummy with Q to cash the established J for his 10th trick.


Most E/Ws will rest in a Spade partscore but if West makes any noise at all, East will bid 4♠.

4♠ is a nice contract but if you are going to bid well you are also going to have to play well. To make 10 tricks, you are going to have to hope that North has the King of Clubs.

Even so, you are going to have to get to dummy twice to take the Club finesse twice – so you will need two entries to dummy. The King of Spades is one and the \$\infty\$8 is a second – provided of course that you did not ruff the third round of Diamonds with the \$\infty\$5!



3NT is a good contract to be in – and if you find yourself in it you should realise that just making it will be an excellent result.

If you give the hand a moment's thought you will see that after you cash the King and Ace of Diamonds you are going to be winning the third round of Diamonds with the 10 in your hand and you will be stranded from dummy's Diamond winners.

One you spot the problem, the solution is to play a small Diamonds from both hands on the first round – now you can win 6 Diamond tricks in peace.




Declarer has 9 top tricks and his 10th trick will come from the Club suit. Everyone will make 10 tricks here by simply taking the Club finesse but the really careful players will make 10 tricks by not taking the Club finesse.

Best play is to win the Spade lead, draw two rounds of trumps (Ace and Queen) and then play Ace and another Club. You can then win the return and get to dummy with the King of trumps to cash the established Club winner.


Most E/W's will rest in 1♠ or 2♠ - especially if some North's muddy the waters by opening 1♣.

Nevertheless all declarers should make 10 tricks if they put their minds to it. The plan should be to ruff two Hearts in Dummy.

Win the Diamond lead and cash AK and ruff a Heart with the ▲10. This will be over-ruffed by North's Jack but you can later ruff your 4th Heart with the ▲9 and then draw trumps – losing 2 Club tricks and the ▲J.

Ok those of you getting a Club lead from South will face a tougher guess at trick 3 – but you should still make 9 tricks even if you guess wrong.


With 25 HCP and an 8 card Spade fit, N/S want to be in 4♠. South's 3♦ is a game forcing jump shift.

Declarer probably loses the first three Club tricks and can see 9 easy tricks after that.

If the Diamonds break 3-3 then declarer has her 10th trick in Diamonds. However the Diamonds are unlikely to break 3-3 so declarer needs to ruff her losing fourth round of Diamonds in dummy.

The solution is to draw just 2 rounds of trumps and then play 3 rounds of Diamonds – if someone ruffs the third Diamond then the contract simply could not have been made – but as it happens nobody ruffs in and now declarer can ruff her losing Diamond in dummy. Well played if you played this way!



All roads lead to 3NT by North. East leads the **AK** and declarer wins the third round of Spades (or the second if you prefer).

Declarer has 5 Diamond tricks and 3 aces so she needs one more trick to make her contract. She has a choice of taking a Club finesse into the danger hand East or a Heart finesse into the safe hand West.

So that's an easy decision – declarer takes the Heart finesse by leading a Heart to the Queen and makes her contract.


South is in 4♠ and gets the ♥Q lead. He can see oodles of tricks by way of Spades, Clubs and a Heart ruff and his only concern is that he doesn't lose 4 tricks.

The only way he can lose 4 tricks is if East gets in with the AQ and switches to a Diamond through declarer's King. So declarer makes sure East does not get in with his AQ and he plays a Spade to the Ace and a Spade to his Jack – ending up with 12 tricks – well played.


East opens 3♥ and West can see a good chance of 9 tricks with at least two more chances of a 10th trick so he raises to 4♥.

Some Souths might double 3♥ and now North might try the good sacrifice of 4♠x-2.

In a 4 v contract, East can see 9 tricks and he can also see the possible loss of 2 Spade tricks and 2 Diamond tricks.

Declarer's 10th trick comes from establish dummy's fifth Club. Win the Diamond lead, play Ace of Clubs and ruff a Club, back to dummy twice more with the Jack and Ten of trumps to ruff 2 more Clubs and then up to the Ace of Hearts in dummy to cash the now good winning Club in dummy.




Some might end up in 6♠ and the trick will be to make 12 tricks even if you are only in 4♠. On a Heart lead you will only make 11 tricks but on the more normal ◆J lead you can set up the Club suit and make 12 tricks.

You win the Diamond lead, draw trumps and play a small Club from both hands. Now you can win the Diamond return, cash the Ace of Clubs and ruff a Club and get back to dummy's ♥K to cash your winning Clubs.



South leads the ♥K against 3NT (or the ♥10 if you insist on leading 4th best).

Declarer has 8 top tricks. The 9th trick will come from the Club suit. Declarer starts by holding up his ♥A until the third round and then endeavour to establish his 9th trick in Clubs – all the while trying to keep South off lead.

The mission is easily accomplished by simply playing a small Club towards the Ace and Ten of Clubs and finessing the \$10. If North has the \$Q and can produce another Heart then the Heart suit will have divided 4-4 and declarer loses only 3 Heart tricks and the 1 Club trick.

On the actual lie of the cards, the Club finesse works and declarer's good play is rewarded with 10 tricks.


West is in 4♠ and North starts off with Ace, King and a third round of Diamonds.

Declarer has 8 top tricks, 5 Spades, 2 Hearts and 1 Club. His two extra tricks will come from ruffing two Hearts in dummy. It's a good plan and well done if you as far as making that plan.

Sounds easy and looks easy – but looks can be deceptive. As in all hands where declarer has to organise a few ruffs in dummy, declarer must postpone the drawing of trumps (1 round is ok but two rounds would be fatal).

So declarer ruffs the third round of Diamonds in hand and cashes the King of Hearts followed by the Ace of Hearts. Now he ruffs a Heart in dummy (and he may as well ruff with one of dummy's big trumps just in case South has only 2 Hearts also).

Now declarer comes back to his hand with a trump and leads his last Heart (the Jack) from hand and ruffs it in dummy with a high trump – his 10th trick.


North ends up in 3NT – one way or another – they have 25 HCP and even if E/W come in to the auction, N/S have the Hearts covered.

Of course, if East leads a Diamond then declarer loses the first 5 Diamond tricks, but most Easts will lead the •Q.


If declarer does get a Heart lead, he should be able to count 9 top tricks assuming the Clubs break 2-2 or 3-1. However, the really good declarers will be able to look deeper and see that there is a potential blockage on the 4th round of Clubs.

The solution, is to follow the rule 'play the high cards from the short hand first ' and make sure to play the 10, 9 and 8 of Clubs under South's Ace, King and Queen of Clubs. Now declarer can cash his 6 Club tricks in peace to go with his 2 Heart tricks and his Ace of Spades.



For at least the third time in a matter of weeks, the 'Rule of 15' has cropped up again.

Some Souths will open 1 and they will be very happy to land in 4 . Other Souths might not open and at those tables the bidding will go Pass-Pass-Pass around to East.

If East passes, she will get a good result and if she opens the bidding she will be annoyed to find her opponents winning the auction and making a contract.

The 'Rule of 15' tells East that she should not open – the total of her points and the number of Spades she holds does not come to at least 15!


Yes there are more scientific ways to bid the hand but when players overcall it tends to make bidding a little murkier.

The play is the important part of this deal – if you are only in 4♥ and can make all 13 tricks that will still get you a good matchpoint result. Even 12 will score well.

A good tip when deciding how to play 9-card fits missing the queen – like the Heart suit above – is to play for the 'drop' if you don't have any side suit singletons or voids in either of your two hands but to take the finesse if you can see a singleton or void.

In the present case, declarer can see a singleton Spade, so she tackles the Heart suit by cashing the King first and then finessing the Jack.



North opens 2♣ showing 23+ HCP. This is game forcing – neither partner can pass until game is reached – the only exception is the sequence 2♣-2♦-2NT (responder is free to pass the 2NT rebid if she has 1 or less points).


After 2♣-2♠, North can rebid a simple 2♠. This is 100% game forcing. South cannot pass. On this hand South has an easy raise to 4♠.

12 tricks are easy once declarer ruffs 3 Clubs in dummy.


E/W have 25 points – they don't have a major suit fit – so they want to end in 3NT.

North leads the 10♠ and declarer counts his tricks – 4 Spades, 4 Clubs and the Ace of Diamonds is 9. The problem is that if declarer does not make a plan, he will find that after cashing the Ace, King and Queen of Clubs he has no ay back to his hand to cash the 4th Club!

The 'pretty' solution is to cash four rounds of Spades

– discarding the *AKQ from dummy. Now declarer
can cash the 4 Club winners in his hand in peace.
Well done Anne-Marie!




4441 hands are always difficult to bid. There are various rules such as open the suit below the singleton, open the lowest, open the middle suit. There is another good school of thought which says not to open these 4441 shapes unless you have at least 14 points.

If West passes then it will be easy for E/W to find their 4-4 Heart fit – indeed it is hard to fault any E/W pair who tries for the unlucky 6♥ on these cards.

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


E/W have 33 points – therefore they want to end in 6NT. After 1♠-2♦-3♣, East has probably heard enough and can just blast 6NT if she feels like it. West's 3♣ bid is game forcing so it shows 15+ and now West knows they have loads of points for slam.

Of course she is still interested in a Grand Slam so it makes sense to continually slowly with 3♥.

Another point of note is East's initial 2♦ response – don't jump-shift with two-suited hands. Another point of note – if you are going to miss slam make sure you bid 3NT – at least you will pick up a few matchpoints.



E/W have 25 points and no major suit fit – so they want to land in 3NT. Sounds easy but quite a few might flounder on the rocks.

The first 3 bids are easy but then the waters start to muddy. East could just blast 3NT at her second turn but then she might miss a possible 5-3 Spade fit. The elegant solution is to use 'Fourth-Suit-Forcing'.

East bids 2 ◆ at her second turn asking West to describe her hand further. West could then say 2NT to show a Diamond stopper but a better bid is 3 ◆ which is known called 'Fifth-Suit-Forcing'. The 3 ◆ bid tends to say I don't have 3-card Spade support but I have the Ace of Diamonds and 3NT will be easier to play from your hand than mine.






East should rebid 2NT at her second turn. Nowadays this rebid shows 18-20 and is forcing to game. West can not pass. The big advantage of playing this 2NT as 18-20 is that it gives East-West plenty of room to investigate a possible 5-3 Spade fit and even investigate a possible 6 contract on occasions.

Of course if West knowingly decides to hide her 5th Spade and just raise 2NT to 3NT – then that is ok too – and if her partner can avoid a Heart lead her good matchpoint decision will be rewarded with 3NT+2.


Yes South should open third-in-hand with either 1 ♥ or 2 ♥ and that should end the auction – making 8 tricks and a good score for N/S.

However if South passes, West should not give South another bite at the cherry – West should also passes. The 'Rule of 15' comes to West's aid here – when deciding whether or not to open in fourth seat after 3 passes, you add the number of Spades you hold to the number of points you hold – if it comes to 15 or more, you open the bidding and if the total does not come to 15 you do not open the bidding.

But if West does decide to open 1. she should then pass her partner's 1. response – remember East was unable to open the bidding so E/W do not have 25 points. Normally a new suit response at the 1-level is forcing for one round but the response is not forcing after a third in hand or fourth in hand opening.

But even if West raises the 1 response to 2, that should probably end the auction – although that East hand does get better looking every time I look at it so maybe it's worth one more try with 3. Unlucky tonight.





It's hard to fault any E/W pair for bidding to 3NT or even 4. If there was a more favourable layout in the Diamond suit E/W would make all sorts of game contracts.

It takes a really disciplined East to pass at the 2 → rebid from opener – these 2 → rebids after a 1 ♥ response tend to show 6-card suits in a minimum hand. However 2 ♠ from East is not a complete stretch but when West rebids 3 ♦, East should really give up now.

What about a 3♥ rebid by West at her third turn? I'm sorry I didn't think of it myself! It's a beautiful bid. It is a very thoughtful bid and the kind of bid that good partners make - straining to support partner rather than repeating their own suits. When you think about it – it must show honour doubleton in Hearts.





This is a hand where you would not mind having a bidding misunderstanding and staying out of slam. To make this slam, declarer has to lead a Club from dummy towards the Queen rather than from hand towards to King – good luck with that one.

Both look equal to me. If you win a Heart lead in dummy, you might lead a Club to the Queen and make the contract. If you get a Diamond lead and win in hand, you might play a Club towards the King and go down.









4♥ by North is a reasonable contract and indeed declarer can make 10 tricks by way of 4 Hearts, 2 Spades, Ace of Clubs, Ace of Diamonds and 2 Diamond ruffs in dummy.

The key for declarer is to see the need to ruff 2 Diamonds in dummy before drawing trumps. Declarer needs 2 trumps in dummy to ruff her two Diamond losers.

The other side of the coin is that East can defeat 4♥ by drawing 3 rounds of trumps - Ace and another trump on the opening lead and a third killing round of trumps when he is back on lead in Diamonds.





Declarer has 10 tricks – 5 Spades, one Club, Ace and King of Diamonds, Ace of Hearts and a Diamond ruff in dummy (ya wha?) – yes a Diamond ruff in dummy.

If North overcalls 2 then declarer should realise that she cannot ruff a Heart in dummy (because South will also be short of Hearts and be able to over-ruff). The solution is for declarer not to ruff the third round of Hearts but instead discard a Diamond from dummy on the third Heart.

Now declarer will be able to ruff the third round of Diamonds in dummy for her 10th trick. This type of play is called a 'loser on loser' play – and is a very common technique.

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

As long as you don't get to 3NT here all will be well. Some might rebid 1 here but that should really be reserved for hands with 5+ Clubs.

East can even open 1♠ (third in hand) and over the 1NT response from West, she should really pass, but if she fancies her hand then a simple invite to 2NT will suffice – asking partner to bid 3NT with 8-9 HCP.

There are 8 tricks available in the play, 1 Spade, 3 Hearts, 3 Diamonds and a Club or two (but by that stage the defenders will have scored 5 tricks).

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

All roads lead to 3NT by North. East should probably lead the •J (top of her internal sequence) – but a small Diamond works just as well tonight – as long as West returns his partner's suit.

East can win the Diamond return with her King and continue with the •J to force out the Queen and establish two Diamond winners for herself – with the Ace of Clubs as an entry.

Unfortunately, E/W can't beat 3NT – but holding declarer to just 9 tricks will be a great score for E/W.



North will open 1. and be left there. Making 1. will be an average result but if the defence are not on the ball they might 'gift' declarer her 8th trick and a very good score for declarer.

Declarer should lose 6 tricks (2 Spades, 2 Hearts, 1 Diamond and 1 Club). East will lead a Diamond and when partner can't play a card higher than the 8 that means declarer has •AQJ and East should know not to continue Diamonds when she gets back in.

East should keep exiting on safe cards – cards that won't give declarer tricks she is not entitled to e.g. a trump or an inspired Spade switch.







4♠ is a reasonable contract and if South makes any kind of squeak North will bid 4♠. But even on bad defence it has no chance…losing a Club, a Diamond and 2 Heart tricks.

Some E/W's might get overboard. Some East's will have some sort of 2-suited gadget available like Michaels or Ghestem (3.4 showing 5+Hearts and 5+Diamonds. The serious players might have the agreement that these gadgets are never used on 'intermediate' strength hands and so be able to avoid getting too high as E/W.

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

If West decides to enter the auction there could be skin and hair flying. This is not a good time for E/W to bid and if they lose 200 or more it will be a bad result for them.

N/S can make 5. but with only 21 points between them they will be unlikely to bid that high. Making 11 tricks in a Club partscore will still be a good result for N/S. The top scores will probably go to the North players who insist on playing in their 6-card Heart suits and end up playing in a Heart partscore making 9 tricks.

North might even decide to simply rebid 2♥ at her first turn.





Some South's will just blast into 4♠ on the second round of the auction. If North does happen to get a say in the matter, she should support her partner's Spades rather than repeat her own suit for a third time.

The experienced Norths will appreciate that their partners will not be disappointed when they see the North hand as dummy....but North will be very disappointed if he gets the South hand as dummy.


It is always good technique to lead towards high cards – even if your plan is to cash the Ace and King, you will be amazed at the nice things that happen if you start off by playing a small card towards your big card first – rather than just cash a big card.

Even if your Ace of Clubs is ruffed at trick one, you will still make 10 tricks if you can keep your other losers to the King of Clubs and the Ace of Hearts. When you discover that South is void in Clubs it makes South a big favourite to have the Queen of Spades – so start by leading a low Spade to dummy's King and now you will be able to avoid losing a fourth trick to South's •Q.



The easy way to 4♠ is for South to respond a simple 1♠ to his partner's 1♥ opening bid and then when he repeats his Spades later on, he will have shown a 5-card suit and North will know to raise to 4♠.

Having a void in partner's suit is always bad news and alarm bells should start ringing. While a 2 → response is strictly correct, perhaps the alarm bell might persuade South to keep it low and start off with 1 ♠.

North also has a void in his partner's suit and there should be another alarm bell ringing in his ear too.


Yes you can make 7♦ or 7NT if you can correctly guess what to do in Clubs – even being in 6♦ or 6NT requires you to get the Club suit right.





South is not strong enough to respond 2♥ on the first round and she can't respond 1NT without a stopper in the opponent's Spade suit. A 'Negative' double is an option if playing such a thing.


Yes there are problems.....on the normal Club lead, declarer has to immediately play on Diamonds to succeed! Declarer's 10 tricks are 5 Hearts, 2 Spades, the Ace of Clubs, a Spade ruff and a Club ruff in dummy....but that is double dummy stuff!

A more sensible line is to hope the Diamonds and Hearts are 3-2 and that the Clubs are not 6-1. You plan to duck the Club lead (Bath Coup), set up the Diamonds and hope to be able to draw trumps (3-2) ending in dummy to be able to enjoy the Diamonds.




At 11 of the 14 tables this board was 'Passed Out'. But in fact East can make 6♥!

It is understandable that West might decide not to open a vulnerable 1 first in hand and it is equally understandable that nobody else at the table chose to open.

Yet a 1♠ opening on the West hand is becoming more and more normal – 2 good 5-card suits. The West hand also conforms to the useful 'Rule of 20' – you add the number of points you have to the number of cards you have in your two longest suits and if it comes to 20 or more you are worth an opening bid.






E/W might decide to stay in 3 and that is a reasonable decision too. But the play is the thing.

Declarer's first hurdle is to start with the ♠K first to cater for a 4-0 trump beak in either hand. Then he draws trumps and knocks out the ♠A and cashes his two Diamond winners.

He will then have learned that North has 6 Hearts, 4 Spades, 2 Diamonds and therefore only one Club. So he cashes the King of Clubs and leads a Club to the Jack in complete confidence. 10 tricks made.


South will probably pre-empt and muddy the waters for E/W so it will not be easy for them to get to 6. On the other hand most will be glad they are not in slam when they only make 11 tricks.

However declarer can make 12 tricks by winning the Heart lead, drawing trumps, ruffing a Heart in hand, cashing the Ace and King of Clubs and exiting on a Heart to South – who will now find himself endplayed into leading a Diamond or giving declarer a ruff and discard. Well played.


Some N/S's might decide to stay in 2NT and that is very reasonable. Those declarers that bid 3NT will have to play well at trick one!

The solution is simple – rise with the Ace of Hearts from dummy when you get the small Heart lead. Now the defender's Heart suit will be blocked. Now declarer can knock out the &A in peace and make 4 Club tricks, 2 Diamond tricks and 2 Spade tricks and the Ace of Hearts.

When East leads a small Heart he is saying that he does not have a sequence in Hearts so declarer knows that East has at least one Heart honour.



Some N/S's went down in 4 here because declarer failed to correctly guess which opponent held the *Q. Declarer can make 3 Club tricks and his contract if he correctly guesses who has that card.

However declarer can avoid the Club guess by drawing trumps and ruffing the fourth Heart in his hand and then playing Ace and another Diamond. Now no matter which opponent wins the Diamond trick, they will be endplayed – being forced to open the Club suit or give declarer a ruff and discard. 4 made.

The only problem is that N/S might get 5 tricks before declarer gets 9. The solution is to hold up the Ace of Hearts until the third round and then take the Club finesse into the safe North hand.


Declarer can cash the A first in case the Queen drops but then he should either play a Club to the 10 or run the Jack of Clubs. Declarer doesn't mind losing a Club trick to North because North won't have an Hearts left. If North does have a Heart left it means the Hearts are breaking 4-4 and declarer will only lose 3 Heart tricks and the AQ. 3NT made.


All Norths will end up in 4♠ (2NT here shows a raise to 3♠). All Easts will lead the ♠Q. Declarer has 9 tricks. His 10th trick will come from the fourth if the Clubs break 3-3 and if you can keep West off lead. If West gets in he will lead the ♥J through declarer and declarer will lose 3 Heart tricks for 4♠-1.

The solution is to duck the ◆K lead! Now declarer can discard a Club on the ◆A, draw trumps and set up the 4th Club by playing Ace, King and ruffing the third round of Clubs in hand.







The 'old' Dummy Reversal trick




Protecting against a 4-0 break in either hand

But the play's the thing! West leads the ♣J and E/W take the first 2 Club tricks and continue with a third round of Clubs, ruffed by declarer.

Did anyone make 4 ? If declarer counts his tricks he will see that he needs 4 Diamond tricks. To make 4 Diamond tricks he needs the E/W Diamonds to break 3-3 and if they are not breaking 3-3 he needs to be able to ruff the 4th round of Diamonds in dummy.


The solution is to draw just two rounds of trumps and then play A,K and Queen of Diamonds. If everyone follows to three diamonds he can draw trumps and cash the 13th Diamond in peace.

If the Diamonds do not break 3-3 (as here) he needs the player with the doubleton Diamond to also have no more than 2 trumps. Now declarer can ruff the 4th round of Diamonds in dummy for his all important 10th trick.




But how could South know that it was declarer and not his partner that had the singleton Club? Well for a start he could ask himself why declarer with a supposed doubleton 8 and 2 of Clubs and followed to trick one with the 8 rather than the 2?

Secondly he could reason that if declarer really had a doubleton 82 of Clubs she might not have covered the Queen lead with the King - to put South to the test to see if South would overtake the Queen with his Ace or not?


The evidence is there – if South took a moment to weigh it up at trick one – that it is declarer who has the singleton Club and not North.








Do we run or not from 1NT Doubled?

Most Wests will open 3NT – showing a solid minor suit and nothing outside their suit.

East will know that West's minor is Diamonds (it can't be Clubs) and if East has stoppers in the other 3 suits he passes the 3NT opening.


East doesn't have a Spade stopper so he knows 3NT cannot be made so he bids 4* knowing that West will convert to his real minor 4* and there they will play and make 8 tricks.

Of course N/S can make 11 or 12 tricks in their own major suit but may find it difficult to bid.

Some E/W pairs arrived got seriously overboard her and lost 1400 and more.

In third seat, partner having passed as dealer, there is always a temptation to do something mischievous to make life a bit difficult for the last player. Some players open light and others open pre-empts on 6-card suits.


South might decide to open 3 • on this hand in third seat. If he were dealer or second in hand he wouldn't. But in third seat – anything goes!

West may as well just bid 3NT over this. The pre-empt will get North off to a good lead for her side – Ace and another Diamond and now declarer has to guess whether South has the Ace of Hearts or the Queen of Clubs. Declarer will probably play North to have the ♥A and play on Hearts at trick 2 and go two light as a result.

The other declarers who don't get the Diamond lead or who are lucky enough to play a Club to the Jack will make 9 or 10 tricks.


Of course West should not have passed the 1NT opening and definitely shouldn't have left 1NT doubled in when it came back to her.

Playing transfers West responds 2 v to the opening 1NT and passes when East bids 2 ★. Even if West does pass the first time, she needs to have some system to help her run from 1NT when she knows she is trouble. Something like 'Transfers on' or 'Helvic' or 'Transfer Helvic'.

Of course nothing is really any good on this hand but there were pairs who out in 2.-3 for a great score to E/W. Some N/S pairs bid 6. and well done to them!






There are many different ways to bid this hand but as long as you do not end up in 5♦ all will be well.

When you are playing an ordinary club matchpoint pairs game - you should go out of your way to play in 3NT rather than in 5 of a Minor. For one thing you get the same score +600 for making 9 tricks in 3NT as for making 11 tricks in 5♦ and secondly you will often find that you will make 10 or 11 tricks in 3NT beating all the pairs in 5♦ even if they make 13 tricks!

In 3NT, declarer needs to abandon the Diamond suit when she learns of the 4-1 split and instead knock out the Club Ace – making 1 Spade trick, 1 Heart trick (maybe 2), 3 Diamond tricks and 4 Club tricks).




There is only a combined 26 HCP in the N/S hands, yet there are 12 easy tricks in a 6 contract, losing one diamond and ruffing the third diamond in dummy for the 12th trick. Not surprisingly only one pair got to 6 and maybe at most tables E/W started bidding Hearts to muddy the waters even more for N/S.

But the 'Slam' signs are all there, N/S have 8+ card fits in two suits, including AKQJ of both suits, an Ace in a third suit and a void in the fourth (opponent's) suit.

The other interesting point is that the hand shows the value of playing in a 4-4 fit rather than a 5-3 fit or even a 6-3 fit. This is because playing in the 4-4 Club fit allows to discard 3 red suit losers on your 6-3 side Spade suit, allowing you make a Grand Slam in Clubs. When the 6-3 Spade suit is trumps you have no such discards coming from the 4-4 side Club suit.


Amazingly very few N/S pairs found their Heart fit, with most pairs landing in a Club contract,

Landing in Clubs isn't so bad as long as you land in 6♣. Remember in a matchpoint pairs game it is rarely right to play in 5♣ and certainly isn't right to just blast into it without at least exploring other game contracts like 4♥ or even 3NT.

North's 'double' here is a 'Support Double' showing 3 card Heart support for partner and now the Heart fit comes to light.





East opens 1 ◆ her longest suit. If South passes, West should respond 1 ♠. A good tip — 'Do not Jump-Shift with 2 suited hands'. Over a 1 ♠ response, East should rebid 3 ♠ because she has more than a minimum — adding 2 points for her singleton Heart — or better still showing a 6 loser hand.

If East just gives a single raise – then West might just bid 4♠ and miss the Slam. But even with a single raise, that West hand is worth a lot more than just a simple raise to 4♠.

She has 5 good trumps, she has 3 aces, she has a singleton in the opponent's suit and she knows that her side also has a 5-3 Diamond fit.


West checks for Keycards and discovers that she is missing one Keycard so she stops in a small slam. There is nothing to the play and everyone makes at least 12 tricks.

Is South worth a 2♣ overcall – yes she is – her hand passes the Suit Quality Test. If she doesn't overcall she won't a get Club lead and declarer will make 13 tricks! Maybe 6♠ would be easier to bid if South doesn't come in?

So how many of the 20 tables bid the Slam? Not one – so don't feel too bad.

A number of E/W's bid too high on this one e.g. 4 -4 and worse. Is South worth an opening bid? Yes – she has 11 HCP and 2 good five card suits.

West doubles to show her good hand. North responds 1 ♥. Now East is off the hook. East does not have to bid. If North had passed then East would have had to bid. So if East does bid here, she is saying that she wants to bid and that she has 7+ HCP.

South rebids 2. showing her second suit and now West can either 'double' again to show her very good hand or bid 2NT to show 19+.

If you managed to stay at or below 2NT by E/W – then you did well and you got a good % score.
