

The analysis is based on 4-card Majors, Weak No-Trump (Strong NT mentioned), Transfers and Weak Two Openings in 3 suits.





The Flannery convention is ideally suited for this type of hand. The opening bid of 2H by West shows 5 hearts, 4 spades and eleven to fifteen points (not strong enough to reverse). It is a convention worth looking up and having in your armoury.

## (Ed: Not easy if playing weak twos in any format!)

East has a good fit in both majors but is without an ace and should content himself by bidding game in a major. In lower level contracts the five four fit can cope better with a forcing defence. The 4 4 fit is more appropriate for higher level contracts as the fifth card in the second suit will provide a discard. It is debatable if East should use a splinter bid in this hand. If it is employed, there is a danger of getting too high as there are



It is not easy for EW to sacrifice in 4S which turns out to be a good save against the heart game.



Many South players will give a simple raise in hearts on the first round. The bid of 1S has the advantage of helping North evaluate his hand as the bidding develops.

It will be a difficult decision for West – whether to sacrifice in clubs or defend 4H. A club force will put 4H in difficulty but careful play will see this contract home.

5C is straight forward with just one diamond, two spades and a heart loser.



Some East players may pass 1NT but with a doubleton small heart a spade contract is best.

South has a difficult opening lead. Any minor suit lead will cost and it is not clear to start with the heart Ace. South may settle for a trump lead (not ideal) and it will work here. Frequently a trump lead will pick up partner's honour card and lose a tempo to the opposition.

There are four tricks for the defence provided they do not get too active. Partnerships in a spade contract will fare better than their NT counterparts.



After a 1D overcall, East's bid of 1H may only show four; similarly a bid of 1S may also show only four. An initial double will show two four card majors.

In the above hand West will simply raise to 2H and the normal heart game will be reached. Unusually a no trump contract will score better if West makes a good guess in the club suit. But most days of the week the heart game will be reached and eleven tricks is the limit on the hand.



It is best for East to pass at his first turn. A bid might show some values – misleading partner who might go astray as the bidding progresses.

South with a good six card suit opposite a partner who has bid is fully justified in introducing his club suit.

West will introduce his other five card major.

Now East will probably give preference to a spade contract. Nine tricks are the limit for either side.

After North opens 1C, it will be difficult for EW to find their vulnerable sacrifice in Clubs. South's bid of 2S shows a six card suit (or seven) and 5 to 7 high

After scoring two top diamonds, it will be necessary for East to cash the Club Ace – otherwise South can take the heart finesse							

and discard a losing club.

Taking the heart finesse is a risky play. If it loses you have generated another loser and floored the contract. But here it could win all the sweets.



West will do well to scramble seven tricks and will need to rise

with the trump Ace if South switches to a spade after over ruffing dummy. The likely lead will be a low club by North. It will be necessary for North to split his diamond honours when a low diamond is played towards dummy.



\*With a nondescript nine points he should not unilaterally bid 3NT on his second bid. East with minimum (for his NT opening) will decline the game invitation.

If South leads his best suit (hearts) East can make nine tricks. The favourable lie of the cards will see East score 2 spades, 2H (after the lead), 2D (the finesse is right) and 3C. A possible diamond lead will hold declarer to eight tricks. Leading your best suit against a NT contract will cost here but it will be right more often than not.



North's 2H overcall will show a six card suit and usually at unfavourable vulnerability will be at the upper range of a weak 2 bid. East mentions his spade suit immediately (sometimes only 5 card) and this bid is best played as forcing for one round. West's bid of 3H shows a strong hand and asks partner to further describe his hand. East shows a sixth spade and West raises to 4S. 6S is not a bad contract.

It appears it will make if the club finesse scores. Here the club finesse loses but the favourable spade situation allows twelve tricks come home.

Optimists who bid to the small slam will score well.

This is a difficult bidding hand to reach the optimum contract of 4S. Some intrepid East players will open 1D and West will have to judge well not to advance past 4S. If East passes on the first round of bidding some West players may overcall 1NT over South's 1H opening and that will pave the way for the spade game to be reached. Holding a side suit singleton is not ideal for the NT overcall.


Some partnerships use the Ghestem convention even in fourth position. Ghestem is a convention that enables two five cards to be shown after an opening of a suit by right hand opponent. In this hand East will bid 3C showing the exclusive suits. It is surprising how many people forget the convention.

With only one spade North does best to overcall clubs on his first bid. South introduces his heart suit (not 6 card as he would have opened) and this bid will generally show club tolerance. North peps up and his jump to 3S agrees hearts (showing 4) and a singleton spade. After Roman Key Card Blackwood North realises there is one Ace missing and the queen of trumps. Holding nine trumps he is hopeful for a favourable break. He feels all his cards are working and bids 6H.

Any partnership that bid the heart slam can congratulate themselves.



The 3NT bid by North will show 13 to 15 high card points and two stoppers in the suit overcalled. South has no reason to advance over that bid.

North is unlikely to divine the club position and eleven tricks will be the normal result. Note that East must play low smoothly on the play of the first club. If perchance West had the club Jack and it fell on the first round the odds favour a finesse of the 10 on the second play of the suit.

The only slight clue to discovering the club position is that South has a singleton heart and there is likely to be a singleton in another hand. West with long hearts is thus favourite to have the side suit singleton should one exist.


Some West players may open on this hand. The diamond suit is of poor quality and it is an Aceless hand.

After a 1S opening by partner, West can bid 3S - a hand showing the equivalent of 11 points and highly invitational. If West opens there is a real danger of the bidding going too high.

A club contract is a good save for NS as ten tricks are the limit for EW.

If South makes a takeout double of 1S, North with two five card suits may push to the five level at favourable vulnerability.

A spade lead is best for the defence and East has too much work to do to score eleven tricks.



The 2S rebid by East is likely to show six cards in the suit. West with an excellent hand uses Roman Key Card Blackwood and with all the key cards advances to 6S. He judges that the diamond suit will provide useful discards if necessary.

If a low heart is led at trick one declarer may finesse and lose a trick. On a club lead declarer can win, draw trumps and the favourable diamond break will allow four losers to be discarded.

Pairs who play in a NT slam will score well. The brave souls who reach 7NT will have their day in the sun.



South, with a good side suit, is worth an opening bid of 3S (there are some who might open 4).

It is difficult to find the winning defence to defeat 4S. Firstly West must lead a diamond and when South leads the spade Jack, West must rise with spade Ace and lead a club to his partner's Ace. A diamond ruff and the heart Ace will lead to four tricks for the defence.

Once South recognises the 2 diamond lead as a singleton, he may get a chance to find the winning play. If West plays low on the spade Jack, South should rise with the King and follow with diamond finesse, confining his losers to the three aces.





Many good players who favour the strong no trump opening recommend a pass from partner with a balanced 8 points. That is the winning action here and if declarer manages nine tricks in no trump he will score well.

In a spade contract there are likely three trump losers in addition to the club Ace.




There are many varied conventions that will enable you to compete over opponent's 1NT opening.

Gay Keaveney recommends the following as the most flexible: 2C = clubs and another; 2D = Majors or D and a major with D longer if it is the second option.

Over 2C partner can pass with clubs or bid 2D with better diamonds and the second suit will be discovered.

In this hand West will get to show both black suits and a spade contract will be reached.

Eight tricks are available in either black suit. If West doubles the strong no trump opening for penalty and East passes NS will have a difficult time as there is no escape from a substantial penalty.



If North intervenes in this hand with a bid of 3D(dangerous) East may compete to 3H.


