A straightforward hand to bid for a change although some East's might run into bother at their second turn. West is showing 5 Clubs and 4 Spades in a hand of up to a bad 17 points. East is being asked to choose between the black suits. The simple option is to choose the $5-3$ Club fit but it is not unreasonable to choose the 4-3 Spade fit by raising to $2 \boldsymbol{A}$.

Bidding $2 v$ in these situations should show a decent 6 card suit in a weak hand. The actual East hand above is definitely not what a $2 v$ rebid should look like. Any declarer who manages to make 9 tricks in $2 *$ or 8 tricks in $2 \uparrow$ will have played the hand very well indeed. Declarer can only afford to play one round of trumps before embarking on a sort of cross-ruff play culminating in ruffing a lot of Hearts in hand.
