



Greetings and felicitations. We meet again. Our basic system is as above. Our signals are smiles and snarls.

Once North shows game-going values via 2NT [18-19], South knows a slam is likely, but in which minor? Remember 1C only promised 2 cards. So 4C suggests that suit, and 4H from North agrees clubs and is a cue-bid. 5D shows the Ace [but denies SA, otherwise South would bid 4S]. North knows the lead is coming up to his SK so it is protected. 6C is therefore the chosen spot.


Any lead but a spade concedes an overtrick. Well done if you got to 6NT by North!

In this situation, South needs a way to invite game without overbidding. If he raises 1S to 2S it shows more than he's got, because North could have no points at all. 2C, bidding the opponents' suit [the "Unassuming Cue-bid"] is the way to enquire if North has extra values. North is quite good – a 5th spade and nice H honours – but I think discretion is the better part of valour in the long run. I must be getting old.

Well done to those who got to 4S.

All roads should lead to 4S.

West does best to lead SA for a look at dummy. Now a club or a diamond give 11 tricks, so let's assume West switches to a heart. Getting back hand with a trump, South must advance the CJ, which will be covered and taken by the Ace. Now South comes to hand via a diamond and finesses the C8 – 11 tricks also.

Some people don't like redoubling on the North hand with 3-card trump support. If 2NT shows a raise to 3S, that's fine.

By the by, did you know that an anagram of Leo Varadkar is Ole Aardvark? I'm just saying, ok?







3D-1 is likely to score above average, because 2S is likely to make.






The issue here is whether to play 3NT or 5C. As it happens, they both make.


3C is a Ghestem 2-suited overcall, showing the red suits here. I much prefer it to Michaels, because Ghestem specifies the minor whereas Michaels doesn't.

Neither side should be allowed to play at the 4-level here. 5H makes if you drop the DQ. EW may well double 5S.

5Sx goes down 3 only if EW take 2 club ruffs. A clever way to achieve this is for West to lead D2!! This is intended as suit preference for a club return, but it needs East to put in the ten, which is asking a lot. If East plays the Ace, then returns a club, that is 2 down. If East returns a diamond, that's just 1 down.

If NS can concede less than 420, they should score well.

Ah yes, fear and loathing in the Sim pairs. I love the smell of napalm on a bridge evening. I confidently predict at least eight divorces as a result of this hand.


Once NS start bidding spades, it's difficult for EW to get to their making games [both 5C and 5D make].

East's 3C is part of the Lebensohl convention, very useful when opponents overcall your 1NT opening. It allows you to distinguish between a weak 3C bid [say AQxxxx and no other points] and a stronger 3C bid, as here. Bidding 3C direct shows that EW have the balance of points.

To show a weak hand, East bids 2NT, which commands West to bid 3C. East now passes if he's weak with clubs, or bids 3 of whatever suit he's got – but it is a weak takeout in all cases.

Once NS go to 4S, I think East will take the money, holding two Aces. Note that if he wanted, East could bid 4NT – this would show diamonds [he's already bid clubs]. It's a variant of the unusual NT.

300 for EW should be a good score.



Drury is a useful convention. It's used by a passed hand [East] after partner opens 1H or 1S. 2C is artificial and shows invitational values with trump support – a direct raise to 2S would be weak. The advantage is that if partner has opened light in 3rd or 4th seat, you get to stay at the 2-level.

On this hand, West can easily envisage slam and rolls out Keycard Blackwood. 5C shows one of the 5 Aces and 5D asks about the trump queen. Holding that card plus a singleton, East can jump to 6S.

Making 6S turns on which way you play hearts...straight finesse or Ace and run the Queen. Here, a finesse and one ruff will get the job done.

I expect 6S to be bid only occasionally – well done if you got there and made it.


Saints preserve us, another slam! We're losing the run of ourselves!

I have North bidding 3C as a straight Acol raise [10-12 points]. Note that it shows at least 5 clubs, since 1C only promised 2 cards. South has a genuine club suit and a big hand so is off to the races again. 5D shows one of the 5 Aces, and that's enough for South. I can't see a foolproof route to 7C.

13 tricks are easy [draw trumps, pitch 2 spades on the diamonds, ruff one spade and throw North's 3rd spade on a heart].

There are other ways to show North's hand. If you play inverted minor suit raises, then 2C is the bid. Another possibility is 2NT, a Jacoby raise showing at least invitational values in support of clubs.



I've conducted numerous seminars for improvers over the years, and the single biggest bidding tip I offer them is that shape eats point count for breakfast. This hand is a perfect example. NS have 18 combined points but 4S is cold, even with the King offside.

North may in fact opt for 4S rather than 3S. South should not double 4H, because he should know that the penalty is unlikely to compensate NS for their available game. It's not beyond the bounds of possibility that East might double 4S holding 2 Aces – would you be confident enough to redouble??

South hasn't many points but has controls in all 4 suits. In a suit contract, Aces and Kings are worth more than 4 or 3 points. If you're not convinced, read the excellent "Better Balanced Bidding" by our own David Jackson. That's why I think South is worth 4S. [3D is an alternative, also constructive].

11 tricks should be standard...clubs don't break but declarer can cross-ruff clubs and diamonds.

East's 2H is a game-forcing reverse, and 3H confirms his 6-5 shape. 5NT shows 2 Aces and a void.

Will you get diamonds right? "Eight ever, nine never" puts you wrong on this deal [it's a rule of thumb that says you don't finesse with 9 cards in the suit, you cash AK]. If you're a nasty suspicious type, you might reason that if East has a void, there's a singleton somewhere. Well done if you made 6H.
