Welcome to the British Summer Simultaneous Pairs. Thank you for playing. I hope you enjoy the event and also the commentary provided by a leading expert. The commentator for this set of hands is Sally Brock.

Prizes in 2019

Heat winners: There will no longer be a prize draw for the heat winners from each club. The budget for these prizes has been added to that for the overall winners.

Overall winners: The overall winners of all Simultaneous Pairs events hosted by the English Bridge Union will each receive a cash prize of £100 per pair. This is an increase from £50 in 2018. The winners of the Bridge England Sims and the Club Stratified Sims will also receive this prize – these events were previously excluded from the prizes.

Host clubs: Every affiliated club which enters a heat of any EBU organised event, will be included in a random draw. One 'entry' in the draw is awarded for every ten tables (or part thereof) which take part in any single heat. The draw will be made at the AGM in November. One 'entry' in the draw is awarded for every ten tables (or part thereof) which take part in any single heat. The draw will be made at the AGM in November. These aspects are unchanged from 2018.

This prize draw allows the EBU to redistribute some of the proceeds back to the clubs which have participated, and it is hoped it will be reinvested in providing services and activities for its members, or supporting a local cause of its choosing.

Blue points are awarded to the top third of the field. Provisional master points are shown but the event is not finalised until all results are in and score corrections have been made. This usually takes about three weeks. It really helps us if you can keep your scorecard for that period. Clubs should keep travellers if still used.

I guess that is fine if you play strong no-trump and are happy to open 1♦ (or 1♣) and rebid 1NT if partner bids 1♠, but it is much more awkward playing Acol, and I would hate to open and have to rebid in a new suit, suggesting an unbalanced hand with 5-4 distribution. As it is, EW then get a clear run. The first two bids are clear enough but how many spades should East bid at his second turn? I would hate not to be in game and am happy to suggest 4-2-2-5 shape as it doesn't usually work out to show a singleton when it is the ace. With eight HCP and three 10s, as West I would make a try over a strong no-trump if partner opened one. It looks as if there are only eight tricks there for declarer, more or less whatever the defence. Declarer can only set up eight tricks without touching clubs, and in order to set up any tricks there he has to lose two. North's 2NT looks normal enough – even if the heart stopper is not as robust as North would like. Then what should South bid? It could be right to transfer to spades, but with such a poor suit and what looks to be a bolster in hearts I would pass rather than risk languishing in some 5-2 fit. I guess the most likely defence is a diamond lead, with diamond continuations at every stage. Declarer should not make more than two tricks in each red suit and a spade. Strong no-trumpers would probably open 1♣ as North, and then East would overcall 1♦. Probably Stayman is the most common. That locates the heart fit but leaves North without a convenient mild slam try. In such circumstances it is probably best to settle for game. East has enough to raise partner and South is quite suitable for spades. The 1NT rebid does not preclude having four hearts so East should look for that fit if suitable. The 3♠ rebid by East is a matter of style; for me it is invitational with a good suit, but others will have different opinions. While West has only a doubleton spade, it is a robust doubleton, and he has good controls. It looks as if 4♠ is difficult to make but suppose the defenders lead clubs. Declarer wins and loses to the ♠K. The defence can cash a club and switch to a diamond. Declarer ducks, wins the heart switch and has enough entries to set up diamonds when they break 3-3. I know many would choose an unusual 2NT, but I hate to do this when my diamonds are longer. When partner has equal length he will always choose clubs. Also, if we don't buy the hand, we give away a lot of information to declarer. Here I would bid diamonds – daring 3♦ even with the adverse vulnerability because of the good playing strength. As a passed hand, West must do something exciting. I like 4♥ as a passed hand to show a 4-card fit for spades, but maybe not everyone would understand this, so I would go for a 4♦ splinter bid. East is not interested facing a passed partner. Declarer can make 12 tricks by rising with the ♥Q, taking a spade finesse, cashing the ♠A dropping the king, cashing his remaining top hearts, play a diamond towards dummy, cash the spades and either drop East's ♣Q, or throw him in with the ♦A to lead away from it.
