

Club Stratified Sim Pairs





Wednesday 9th March 2022 Welcome to the eleventh 'Club Stratified Simultaneous Pairs'. Our commentator today is Paul Bowyer, experienced bridge teacher and writer.

How stratification works (and which stratum you should be in): There are four strata.

1. Stratum 'A' is open to everyone but if either member of the pair is a Tournament Master or above you will be in this stratum and can only get master points from the overall ranking.


- 2. If both of you are below the rank of Tournament Master you will be 'B' stratum;
- 3. both below Master means you will be in 'C' stratum and
- 4. both below District Master will make you 'D' stratum.

Blue points and local points will be awarded to the top third of the overall ranking list. In addition the top third of each stratum will get blue points and local points. If you are entitled to overall points and points for your stratum, you will only get the higher of the awards – you won't get two lots of points! You will appreciate that Master Points cannot be allocated until after the event is finalised, which usually takes about three weeks. Please keep your scorecard for that period: if we find any unusual scores we may need to contact the club scorer and the players.



We start off with a very good slam available to North-South but with no clear route to get there. I've been racking my brains for a convincing sequence to arrive at $6 \bullet$ and can't find one, especially if West sticks his oar in with $3 \bullet$. It is possible (indeed, likely) that many open that South hand with $2 \bullet$,

Benjamin style. Quite how that helps isn't clear, though, as West may intervene with $3\clubsuit$ and that may float back to South. $3\bigstar$ will be raised to $4\bigstar$ and there the matter will rest.

After the \bigstar K lead it is possible to make all thirteen tricks in Spades, but best play is actually to rely on a likely 4-2 heart split to ensure twelve tricks (test the trumps by cashing the \bigstar A, cash the \forall A, \forall K, ruff a heart and draw trumps ending in dummy). Lots of 480s, a few 510s and a smattering of 980s? We shall see.

By contrast with Hand 1, this deal is likely to be far easier to bid. Playing a weak no-trump the auction should be over in two bids. Playing a strong no-trump, South will open 1th and North has a choice of routes now; he may even jump to 3NT again, playing the hand from his side of the table.

The bidding may be routine and rapid, but the play may take more time. Despite the possession of 26 points, game is no cakewalk and our old friend *Deep Finesse* tells us that it should be defeated. It doesn't appear to matter who plays the hand or whether the defenders attack spades or diamonds, declarer simply doesn't have nine tricks and the defenders can always set up enough winners to beat the hand.

A series of scores of 100 to East-West?

A part-score deal where North-South may do well if they steal the deal in $3\clubsuit$. That contract cannot be beaten; if the defence leads trumps, declarer can make six trump tricks, two hearts and a spade ruff. If they lead something else declarer can get at least two spade ruffs on table.


What about the auction? Well, those playing four-card majors may bid as indicated above. West has to let 3♣ go as he cannot justify a further bid. Variations may occur where West (playing five-card majors) opens 1♣. He may play there for a horrible score of -200 or -300. Then there are some who think it right to open 2NT with 19 points. Maybe this deal will convince them of the error of their ways as that seems destined for another large minus score.

An interesting deal, this one both in the bidding and the play. After two Passes what should East open? 1^{e} , 2^{e} , 3^{e} ? All would have their adherents. After a calm 1^{e} opening, South has an easy take-out double and West a pre-emptive raise to 3^{e} . North might double that for take-out or might bid try 3^{e} , according to taste, and South has an easy 4^{e} bid.

Most, then, should end in 4♠ by North-South but there will be a considerable number who play the East-West cards in hearts. Indeed, 5♥ is a good sacrifice as there are always nine tricks available for their side.

What of the play in 4♠? After a heart lead there is a good case to ruff and play a club. When (if) the queen holds, declarer might cash two top trumps, intending to play on diamonds, thus making eleven tricks.

An interesting, competitive part-score deal with much depending on system and style. If East were to open a weak no-trump, South may well have some sort of conventional weapon to unleash. Here, in the auction above, 2♣ shows both majors and 2♠ by North shows no preference. South bids his lower five-card suit and now West has to decide whether to allow North-South to steal the deal or to compete with his five-card suit. 3♣ is dangerous, but this is match-point pairs and the opponents should not be allowed to take liberties. 3♣ may well push North overboard and at least East-West will go plus.

Where East opens something other than 1NT the auction is hard to predict. South may well make some sort of two-suited noise and North-South may well play in three of a major failing by a trick.

Vow. This hand may well produce some interesting scores. South has clear-cut opening bid of 1 → and after that it's something of a free-for all. Vest probably does best to double and North may well make a pre-emptive aise to 3 ◆. East is fully entitled to try 3 ♥ now and South may as well cut out round of bidding by "sacrificing" in 5 ◆. West is sure to double that and, to veryone's surprise, there is no way to defeat it.

The best that East-West can do is to bid 5♥ and go off in that. Sure, *Deep Finesse* says that North-South can defeat that by two tricks, but it is not easy to find the spade ruffs that are required to achieve that result.


I'm sure that some East-West pairs will be allowed to play in major-suit games and make them, so we may well see game recorded in both directions on this one.

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♥ is the rightful contract here and, with hearts 2-2, eleven tricks are nakeable, losing just two diamond tricks. Declarer has to get spades right, lowever, taking the ruffing spade finesse rather than playing a spade to the jueen. By this method he has a way of disposing of a club loser.

Reaching 4♥ may not be that straightforward. After South opens 1♠ North has little option but to respond with an uneasy call of 1NT. South has enough to raise to 2NT and now North can show the true nature of his hand with a leap to the heart game.

Some Souths may open with a strong no-trump. Here, North has enough for a direct shot at game. He might try 4♥ immediately or, more likely, transfer the declaration into his partner's hand before jumping to game.

After that, South may well overcall 1♥ and North dredge up a raise. East should double for take-out and West should retreat to 3⁺, ending the auction. 3⁺ may make on the nose or make an overtrick. Those who open 2NT may play there, recording 120 or 150. I'm going to predict scores of 110, 120, 130 and 150 to East-West on this one.

This deal belongs to North-South in a heart or no-trump part-score. Yes, Deep *Finesse* says that they can make 3NT and 4♥ but this only because of a fortunate layout of the cards and, in any case, requires the right view in hearts. In fact, they may well not get into the auction if West opens the bidding with a weak no-trump. North cannot bid over that and South is stymied after East transfers to spades.


2. plays like a dog for East-West and, after a club lead, should go three down. Quite how good or bad a score of -150 will be for East-West is moot; where North-South do get into the auction they may well play in hearts. If so, they may record 140 or 170 depending on the view they take in trumps.

A marginal hand this, with some players reaching a thin 3NT and some declining the game invitation. After West opens with a weak no-trump, East's intermediate cards justify a raise to 2NT. Whether East should employ Stayman *en route* with a stubby 4·3·3·3 shape is moot.

3NT, as Deep Finesse smugly informs us, is destined to fail. True, but not if North leads a diamond, high or low. A spade lead is best, but North may struggle to find that, especially if East has wheeled out Stayman. A heart lead might still defeat 3NT, but the defence has to be sharp after that.

Many will make nine tricks in no-trumps on this one, recording scores of either 150 or 600 depending on whether they are in a part-score or in a game.

After a run of part-score deals we have ourselves a game. North-South can make 3NT or 5[®] for the same score of 400 points. (The reason that 3NT makes from the South hand and not by North, by the way, is that a diamond lead from East is fatal).

The auction above is not unreasonable. After South opens $1 \ge 1$ in third seat, West has a choice of overcalling $1 \diamond$ or making a take-out double. If he takes the latter path, North may make a pre-emptive raise to 3. and South may try his luck in 3NT.

With two aces to lose, 5 definitely needs the spade finesse to succeed; 3NT may make without it if West leads a low diamond (declarer can make one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and four clubs). The \mathbf{PQ} lead, though, has declarer sweating a little.

Back to competitive part-score deals. North-South can make the highest contract here as 3♥ is easy-peasy, but it would pay East-West to bid 3♠ over that. One down is cheap, even if doubled.


The auction above is reasonable if not clear-cut. After a marginal 14 opening bid from South and a 1 overcall, North probably does best to make a take-out double as he lacks the values to bid 2. After South bids 2. and West bids $2 \bigstar$ it is obvious to compete to $3 \checkmark$ with the North cards. Now it's up to East. With scattered values and partner known to have six spades, it's not ridiculous to try his luck with 3 - the winning action on the deal.

Another part-score deal with North-South doing best to play the deal in a quiet 1NT. Strong no-trumpers might reach 2NT if North opens 1NT and South makes an ambitious game try, but those playing a weak no-trump should bid as above.

Deep Finesse claims that 3NT can make from the North hand. Yeah, right. After a low diamond lead, declarer has to play with a sight of all four hands to make nine tricks.

You rarely have to reach poor games like this to score well in a pairs contest; making 150 in 1NT + 2 will rake in most of the match-points.


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
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
