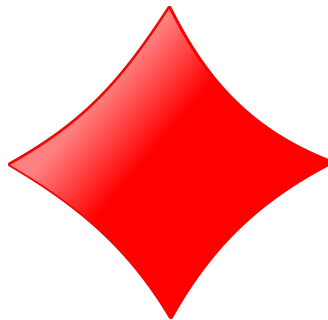
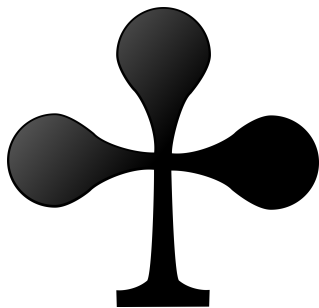
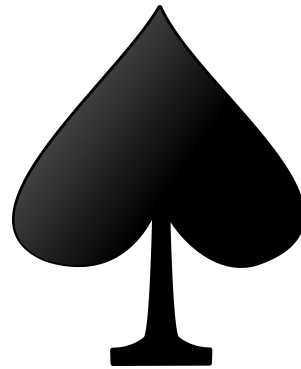


Club Stratified Sim Pairs



Wednesday

9th March 2022

Welcome to the eleventh 'Club Stratified Simultaneous Pairs'. Our commentator today is Paul Bowyer, experienced bridge teacher and writer.

How stratification works (and which stratum you should be in):

There are four strata.

1. Stratum 'A' is open to everyone but if either member of the pair is a Tournament Master or above you will be in this stratum and can only get master points from the overall ranking.
2. If both of you are below the rank of Tournament Master you will be 'B' stratum;
3. both below Master means you will be in 'C' stratum and
4. both below District Master will make you 'D' stratum.

Blue points and local points will be awarded to the top third of the overall ranking list. In addition the top third of each stratum will get blue points and local points. If you are entitled to overall points and points for your stratum, you will only get the higher of the awards – you won't get two lots of points! You will appreciate that Master Points cannot be allocated until after the event is finalised, which usually takes about three weeks. Please keep your scorecard for that period: if we find any unusual scores we may need to contact the club scorer and the players.

I've been racking my brains for a convincing sequence to arrive at 6♠ and can't find one, especially if West sticks his oar in with 3♣. It is possible (indeed, likely) that many open that South hand with 2♣, Benjamin style. Quite how that helps isn't clear, though, as West may intervene with 3♣ and that may float back to South. 3♠ will be raised to 4♠ and there the matter will rest.</p> <p>After the ♣K lead it is possible to make all thirteen tricks in Spades, but best play is actually to rely on a likely 4-2 heart split to ensure twelve tricks (test the trumps by cashing the ♠A, cash the ♥A, ♥K, ruff a heart and draw trumps ending in dummy). Lots of 480s, a few 510s and a smattering of 980s? We shall see.</p>

If East were to open a weak no-trump, South may well have some sort of conventional weapon to unleash. Here, in the auction above, 2♣ shows both majors and 2♦ by North shows no preference. South bids his lower five-card suit and now West has to decide whether to allow North-South to steal the deal or to compete with his five-card suit. 3♣ is dangerous, but this is match-point pairs and the opponents should not be allowed to take liberties. 3♣ may well push North overboard and at least East-West will go plus. Where East opens something other than 1NT the auction is hard to predict. Declarer has to get spades right, however, taking the ruffing spade finesse rather than playing a spade to the queen. By this method he has a way of disposing of a club loser. Reaching 4♥ may not be that straightforward. After South opens 1♠ North has little option but to respond with an uneasy call of 1NT. South has enough to raise to 2NT and now North can show the true nature of his hand with a leap to the heart game. Some Souths may open with a strong no-trump. Here, North has enough for a direct shot at game. A part-score deal with East-West able to make the highest contract in clubs. Having said that, hearts plays well for their side and 140 is available with the fortunate disposition of the trump suit.

The auction may well end in 2♣ at many tables (after East-West bid 1♥–1NT–2♣ and that gets Passed out). However, some enterprising Souths may reopen the auction with a take-out double, allowing North to bid 2♦. Nonetheless, East has a clear-cut raise to 3♣ and that’s where matters should rest.

Many will make nine tricks in clubs although ten are available if declarer takes the heart finesse.

Another part-score deal with a variety of possible outcomes. Some Norths may be left high and dry in 1♠; at other tables West may protect with 1NT or even a take-out double. The auction above seems reasonable to me, although North-South do best to defend 1NT and lead the ♣J. (To be completely accurate, North has to avoid leading spades to defeat 1NT).

2♣ by North should quietly expire after East leads the ♥Q but these things have been known to slip through under the radar. Did anybody manage to reach 2♦ by South? A score of 90 should be decent, beaten only by the scores of 100 for East-West going off in something or other.

An interesting deal with a variety of possible outcomes. The only making game for East-West is 3NT (5♦ is beaten by a spade ruff) but some might not play there. North may bid spades and suffer a penalty (you’ll note that – according to *Deep Finesse* – it is East-West who can make eight tricks in spades). However, it may not be possible to extract a penalty as most low-level doubles are for take-out and the auction is unlikely to proceed in such a manner that East doubles 2♠ and West Passes it.

In the auction above, West prefers the natural 2♣ response to 1♠ and is awkwardly placed after North’s 2♠ is Passed round to him. Double is for take-out in this auction, so East will show his diamonds and a frustrated West may take refuge in no-trumps.

After a run of part-score deals we have ourselves a game. North-South can make 3NT or 5♣ for the same score of 400 points. (The reason that 3NT makes from the South hand and not by North, by the way, is that a diamond lead from East is fatal).

The auction above is not unreasonable. After South opens 1♣ in third seat, West has a choice of overcalling 1♦ or making a take-out double. If he takes the latter path, North may make a pre-emptive raise to 3♣ and South may try his luck in 3NT.

With two aces to lose, 5♣ definitely needs the spade finesse to succeed; 3NT may make without it if West leads a low diamond (declarer can make one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and four clubs). The ♥Q lead, though, has declarer sweating a little.

Back to competitive part-score deals. North-South can make the highest contract here as 3♥ is easy-peasy, but it would pay East-West to bid 3♠ over that. One down is cheap, even if doubled.

The auction above is reasonable if not clear-cut. After a marginal 1♣ opening bid from South and a 1♠ overcall, North probably does best to make a take-out double as he lacks the values to bid 2♥. After South bids 2♥ and West bids 2♠ it is obvious to compete to 3♥ with the North cards. Now it's up to East. With scattered values and partner known to have six spades, it's not ridiculous to try his luck with 3♠ – the winning action on the deal.

Another part-score deal with North-South doing best to play the deal in a quiet 1NT. Strong no-trumpers might reach 2NT if North opens 1NT and South makes an ambitious game try, but those playing a weak no-trump should bid as above.

Deep Finesse claims that 3NT can make from the North hand. Yeah, right. After a low diamond lead, declarer has to play with a sight of all four hands to make nine tricks.

You rarely have to reach poor games like this to score well in a pairs contest; making 150 in 1NT + 2 will rake in most of the match-points.

North-South have a combined 27 points and will surely reach a game, 4♠ being much better than 3NT. The no-trump game is beaten out of sight by club leads, 4♠ is the more normal contract.

The bidding above is normal enough for weak no-trumpers; 1NT shows 15-16 and 2♣ is checkback, looking for the 5-3 spade fit.

Now, *Deep Finesse* tells us that 4♠ should fail, but West has to lead a diamond for this to be true. On any other lead 4♠ can be made, but there are many twists and turns possible in the play. Some will play 4♠ from North after a strong no-trump and a transfer. Here, the inevitable ♣A lead will give North an important helping hand.

An uninteresting deal, this one. The world, his wife and the family dog are going to play this one in 3NT where there are nine easy tricks (two spades, one heart, three diamonds and three clubs). East-West can do little about it and should concede 600 points with good grace.

Any deviation from the plethora of scores of 600 in the North-South column will come if declarer somehow manages an overtrick. That will come only if there is a defensive howler, though.

After the world’s dullest board (Hand 21) we revert to a potentially competitive part-score deal. Those paying a weak no-trump may steal the deal as East-West as in the auction above. Some bright sparks as West may apply Stayman and strike gold when the 4-4 heart fit comes to light; 2♥ plays much better than 1NT.

1NT looks like it should be defeated by two tricks after the obvious diamond lead for a horrible match-point score of -200 – East should be held to one diamond, three hearts and one club trick. If East somehow manages to sneak a spade trick through, he will get out for one off and a decent match-point score. Strong no-trumpers may open 1♣ on the East cards. That allows South to overcall 1♦ and for North to compete in diamonds. Anyone who scores +110 as North-South is going to beat all the penalties of 100 but will lose out to the penalties of 200.

Another part-score deal of little interest. It is, however, amusing to note that South can make a one-level contract in all denominations and North is virtually in the same position, except the unlikely contract of 2♦ is available there. Many will bid as in the auction above and will subside in 2♠. Those whose methods don't allow then to respond at the two-level on the South cards will probably also reach the same contract, possibly after bidding 1♠–1NT–2♣–2♥–2♠. Against 2♠, East is likely to lead the ♣9 and that should scupper the contract. The defenders can always manoeuvre to take a trump, three diamonds, a club and a club ruff.

These deals tonight, regrettably, contain many hands where the auctions are likely to be brief and uninteresting. Here is a case in point with West's opening bid of 1NT being Passed out. Strong no-trumpers may open 1♣ on the West cards and see East respond 1♦ but that hardly allows South a sniff of the action even with 14 points. East-West are still likely to play 1NT after a 1♣–1♦ start whether West rebids 1NT or 1♥, the only difference being that East may declare the contract rather than West. Somewhat preposterously, East-West can make nine tricks in no-trumps. Well, that's because the ♦A lies right, the ♣Q lies right, the spades break and the hearts lie in a miracle position. In any case, after a club lead from North and club return, declarer has to remove North's heart entry early. Anyone bidding and making 3NT can't complain about bad luck for at least a year. There will be a few scores of 150 to East-West and plenty of 120s.

This deal has some interest in that the North-South cards can make a slam contract. 6♣ is available but is no one's idea of a good contract as it requires the ♥A to lie on the right side and then some. Many will bid as above and reach the ubiquitous match-point contract of 3NT. Ten tricks are available, but declarer has to read the cards well to rake them in. After a diamond lead, won by the ♦A, declarer can run five rounds of clubs and put West under loads of pressure. If declarer has the bottle to play a heart next he will score a tenth trick, if he merely cashes the top spades he will hold himself to nine.



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
